APIDA Spotlight: AAAS & Seattle







APIDA Center goes to Seattle!

From April 24-28, 2024, the APIDA Center, supported generously by the Student Success Fee program, took students to the Association for Asian American Studies (AAAS) Conference in Seattle, Washington. (Kudos to the following SDSU faculty who were scheduled to present at AAAS: Dr. Lashon Daley, Dr. Alvin Henry, Dr. Brian Hu, Dr. Amira Jarmakani, Dr. Virginia Loh-Hagan, and Dr. Stephen Suh.)

In addition to attending the AAAS conference, students were busy taking in Seattle APIDA history and other sites of interest. Some highlights included Wing Luke Musuem, tour of Chinatown-International District, Space Needle, Sunset Sail Trip around Pugent Sound, Pike Place, Great Wheel, City Ghost Tour, and Seattle Asian Art Museum (where we met Cambodian American artist, Anida Yoeu Ali).

However, the biggest highlight of our trip was visiting the Filipino American National Historical Society (FANHS) headquarters and actually meeting Dr. Dorothy Cordova!!! Fred and Dorothy Cordova are major figures in the preservation of Filipino American history. Since the 1950s. the Cordovas have been advocates for the rights and welfare of the Fil-Am community. At Seattle University, they promoted Fil-Am stories in university-wide publications. They formed Filipino Youth Activities (FYA) and in the early 1980s, they established FANHS. Today, there are over 40 chapters of FAHNS. The Cordovas pushed for the formalization of Filipino American History Month (FAHM) in October and have made historic achievements in advocating for Fil-Am history to be included in the U.S. education system. Fred Cordova dedicated his time to FANHS as a volunteer archivist until his passing in 2013. Today, Dorothy Cordova continues to advocate for immigrant communities and was a recipient of the Beth Chave Award for Preservation Champion (2023). The SDSU APIDA Center was so excited to meet this Fil-Am legend!



















Know APIDA History!

APIDA Center learns about pensionados!

The city of Seattle has a significant history of Filipino migrant workers and pensionados, similar to the migration patterns of Filipinos in San Diego.

In 1883, the first Filipino in Seattle named "Manilla" (after the largest city in the Philippines) had migrated to Washington and was employed at the Port Blakely Lumber Mill.

Following the establishment of the 1903 Pensionado Act, the U.S. government funded the migration and education of Filipino students in the United States. Known as "pensionados," these Filipino scholars attended various colleges in the United States. This tactic of "civilizing" and "assimilating" Filipinos to Western education, contributed to colonial construction of the U.S. imperial powers in the Pacific.

In 1903, the first Filipinos arrived in San Diego to attend the San Diego Normal School, now known today as San Diego State University. By 1912, over 200 Filipinos had graduated from various U.S. collegiate institutions. The University of Washington had the highest enrollment rates of pensionados.

APIDA Center hosts crafting events!

On May 1st, to kick off our APIDA Month celebration, Dr. <u>Christine DeLisle</u> gave a talk about CHamoru midwifery and the importance of perserving ancient knowledge and sacred practices of indigenous peoples.
