#### From Dr. Loh-Hagan: Happy FAHM 2024!

As an <u>Asian American Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution</u> (<u>AANAPISI</u>), we are thrilled to be celebrating our fifth annual <u>Filipinx</u> <u>American History Month (FAHM)</u> this October.

The Filipinx American community at SDSU is strong and thriving. In addition to the <u>Asian Pacific Islander Desi American (APIDA)</u> Center, the Filipinx American community is active through the <u>Andrés Bonifacio Samahan</u> student organization, the <u>Asian Pacific Student Alliance (APSA)</u> student organization, the <u>Bayanihan Employee Resource Group</u>, the <u>APIDA Employee Resource Group</u> and others. This year, SDSU has established an Office for AANAPISI Affairs, which aims to further elevate and amplify the SDSU APIDA community.

The APIDA Center will be supporting Filipino American National Historical Society's (FANHS) 2024 FAHM theme, "Struggle, Resistance, Solidarity, and Resilience." Struggle and resistance refer to the ways that the Filipinx American community has persisted through various types of systemic oppression and violence. Solidarity includes the ways that Filipinx Americans have organized to fight against injustice. Resilience involves the ways in which Filipinx Americans have successfully overcome adversity. The FANHS states, "From the painful to the triumphant, all of these moments contribute to a cumulative Filipino American history. We encourage our communities to reflect on our history and celebrate our collective love and joy."

## **APIDA Flex Alerts!**

**Rusti Rasing**, a graduate student in the MA History program, presented the first chapter of his thesis at the 2024 National Conference for Filipino American National Historical Society (FANHS) in July. His first chapter focused on the Filipinx cultural ideology of *Utang na Loob*. His thesis is entitled, Choice v. Influence: Retelling Immigration Through Filipino American Agency. His research aims to explain Filipinx American immigration through the perspective of individual agencies of Filipinx Americans after 1946 Philippine Independence. Specifically, he places significant focus on internal and cultural motives of Filipinx Americans rather than external factors. Currently, scholarship largely attributes Filipinx American immigration to the dominant western narrative of economic opportunity vis-a-vis the American Dream ideology. This dominant narrative perpetuates western hegemony while minimizing the histories and agencies of Filipinx Americans. Rasing's research highlights that Filipinx Americans actively made the choice to immigrate rather than be influenced by external factors.

Dr. **Minjeong Kim**, Chair of the Center for Asian and Pacific Studies, has been elected to serve on the Northeast Asia Council of the Association for Asian Studies (2024-2027). She was quoted in a *New York Times* article, "Found in Translation: Asian Languages Onscreen."

Dr. **Minjeong Kim** and Dr. **Stephen Cho Suh,** Associate Professor of Asian American Studies, are co-Principal Investigators of the 2023 Laboratory Program for Korean Studies Grant from The Academy for Korean Studies. Their project is titled "Global Korea, Transnational Koreans: Comparative Approaches of Korean Migration and Dynamic Mobilities of Koreans and Asians."

Dr. **Stephen Cho Suh** was interviewed for: "Return of the descendants," by Jessica Buchleitner in Aeon. April 23, 2024.

Dr. **Sandra Wawrytko** spent her sabbatical last year working on a book project entitled, "Reading *The Tale Of Genji* Through *The Lotus Sūtra*: Murasaki's Philosophical Insights." Rather than approaching the text as a literary work Wawrytko employs creative hermeneutics to examine the epistemological and neuroscientific aspects of what has been categorized as a psychological novel.
