
APIDA Center Highlights: News to Know!

All Things APIDA: Recommendations



Dr. Brian Hu, Associate Professor in the School of Theatre, Television, and Film, is recommending *Terminal USA*. He said, "In the early 90s, public television realized they needed more diversity and fresher voices, so they commissioned several films for a series they called 'TV Families.' If they thought they were getting all-American values on the network that Big Bird built, think again. Director Jon Moritsugu turned in the filthiest, most anarchic and despicable, deliciously 'negative' representation of Asian Americans that still shocks to this day. It's a Japanese American nuclear family sitcom: mom, dad, kids, and grandpa under one roof. But hidden in the closet is a deranged underbelly to the so-called model minority. Cocaine and sex tapes, skinheads and patricide. Nearly a third of PBS affiliates around the nation refused to show Terminal USA, but clearly Mortisugu didn't care. He spits in the eye of authority and standards of quality, a brazen call for Asian American cinema to be punk rock rather than just play by the rules. Don't believe me? Search Terminal USA in the SDSU library catalog and stream it for yourself. Just don't watch it with your family around."
