

#### APIDA Center remembers 9/11 and condemns Islamophobia!

This upcoming Sunday is September 11. On September 11, 2001 (referred to as 9/11), the United States was attacked by Al-Qaeda, an Islamic terrorist group. Shortly after, many South Asian, Arab, Muslim, and Southwest Asian Americans reported racial profiling, hate crimes, and other discriminatory acts stemming from fears generated by the attacks. Essentially, they were scapegoated for 9/11. They were assumed to be "terrorists" because of their skin color, ethnic clothes, language, religion, and other visible and invisible markers of cultural and ancestral identity. That hate is referred to as Islamophobia. Tragically, on September 15, 2001, Balbir Singh Sodhi, a Sikh American, was killed in the first 9/11-related hate crime at a gas station he owned in Mesa, Arizona. According to a report by Asian Americans Advancing Justice, over 500 hate crimes were reported during this period.

In October 2001, Congress passed the USA PATRIOT Act to stop and punish terrorist acts; this allowed for the legal surveillance of certain communities. South Asian and Southwest Asian Americans were especially targeted. This act also led to the DREAM Act not passing; the DREAM act provided a pathway to citizenship for undocumented immigrants who arrived in the country as children. Instead, the U.S. government focused on deportations. To protect themselves, some South Asian and Southwest Asian Americans distanced themselves from their culture and religion.

Since 2001, South Asian Americans (i.e., The Sikh Coalition, South Asian Americans Leading Together, etc.) have actively resisted and countered the harmful stereotypes and assumptions created by Islamophobia. Combatting anti-Asian hate is everyone's responsibility. Educate yourself and fight against Islamophobia.



Krishna Murthy Kattiyan Ramamoorthy, doctoral student in computer science, is recommending Ponniyin Selvin, a 5-part historical fiction novel series by Kalki Krishnamurthy, originally written in Tamil. Krishna said, "This Game of Thrones-style novel captures the significant events (love, betrayal, war and power struggle) that happened during three generations of the Chola dynasty (900-1100AD). These books mean so much to me as they constantly remind me of the heritage I come from which has experienced so much oppression in modern-day society. The books create a fantasyland that we all dream to live in. Each and every character has been so well-written. I was stunned by how broad-minded the ancient Tamil people were. The books also talk about women empowerment. I was surprised that women were regarded so highly in ancient dravidian society.
