Celebrate Native American Heritage Month!

It's hard to believe that October is over and November is here. We have celebrated a fabulous <u>Filipinx American History Month</u> with over 20 programs, social media campaigns, etc. Thanks to all those who attended our events and amplified our work.

As we move into November, it's now time to celebrate <u>Native American</u> <u>Heritage Month</u> (NAHM) with the <u>SDSU Native Resource Center</u>. NAHM is a time to recognize the significant contributions of Native Americans and a time to learn about the cultures of those whose lands we reside on. The Native Resource Center has developed a robust schedule of events that bring Native Americans and Indigenous folks to the forefront in order to combat the erasure of tribal traditions, histories, and perspectives. A Moment in APIDA History:

Know our histories to know ourselves!



APIDA Center learns about an indigenous Pacific Islander tradition!

Some Pacific Islanders are from islands colonized by the United States, so they are native to land that is now called America. Although Pacific Islanders are distinct from Native Americans, it is important to acknowledge their shared commonalities regarding indigenous roots and the impacts of settler colonialism.

San Diego is home to the largest <u>Pacific Islander Festival</u> in the United States. This festival was established in 1994, as a celebration to welcome the Hōkūle'a, a historic Hawaiian canoe. The Hokule'a is named "Star of Gladness" and has sailed over 140,000 nautical miles across the Pacific. The Hōkūle'a arrived in San Diego in 1994 with the permission of the Kumeyaay people. This canoe is famous for reviving Hawaiian culture and for building solidarity with indigenous communities across the world.

The first voyage of the Hōkūle'a began on March 8, 1975. This canoe was designed by Herb Kawainui Kane, a founder of the <u>Polynesian Voyaging</u> <u>Society</u>. Kane designed the double-hull canoe to resemble the canoes sailed by Polynesian ancestors who first sailed to the Hawai'i archipelago. This 1975 voyage inspired a renewal of Polynesian navigating traditions (which only used the stars, winds, and ocean swells as guides) during a time where Hawaiians were at risk for cultural extinction in the 1960s.

Aside from cultural restoration, the purposes of the Hōkūle'a voyages were to advocate for climate change prevention, ocean sustainability, and protection of indigenous culture. The voyagers on the Hōkūle'a asked for permission to arrive at first nations peoples' lands to honor and respect the native people of these places. They took the opportunity to celebrate similarities in culture with indigenous groups and share native knowledge.

During the same year (1994) of the Hōkūle'a arrival on Kumeyaay land (San Diego), the Native American Environmental Protection Coalition (NAEPC) was founded in Southern California to collectively address environmental concerns. The Hōkūle'a is the spirit of Polynesian ancestors' ability to triumph over adversity and their passion for exploration.


APIDA Center Highlights: News to Know!

- The <u>Minority/Women in STEM Scholarship</u> is awarding \$1000 to five students who identify as a first-gen/low-income BIPOC and/or female student. Apply by November 19, 2022.
