The APIDA Center is closed today in honor of Veterans Day, a day to celebrate the service of all U.S. military veterans. It is celebrated on November 11th because major hostilities of World War I ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918. November 11th became a federal holiday in the United States in 1938.

At SDSU, the <u>Barron Veterans Center at SDSU</u> has been proudly serving over 4000 military-connected students. In addition, the <u>SDSU Military &</u> <u>Veterans Faculty & Staff Association Employee Resource Group</u> provides a space for our employees.


APIDA Center celebrates APIDA veterans!

Asian immigrants faced great discrimination as a result of anti-Asian laws and policies. Many were at risk for deportations. Because of this, some enlisted in the military as a way to maintain their U.S. residency. Despite their service, many Asian American veterans were not honored, compensated, or formally recognized by the U.S government for their military service.

Murray Lee, a Chinese American veteran from San Diego and historian for the <u>San Diego Chinese Historical Museum</u>, had enlisted in the Merchant Marines in 1945. He worked with the <u>Chinese American</u> <u>Citizens Alliance</u> to push for the awarding of the Congressional Gold Medal to Chinese American veterans. This national effort to recognize Chinese American veterans was initiated in 2016 and was finally actualized in 2020. In 2020, only 300 Chinese American veterans were still alive to receive the award. One of those heroes was 94-year-old Willie Pong. Pong enlisted in the Navy in 1943 when he was 17 and worked as a cook on Navy ships for three years. He's one of the 20,000 Chinese Americans who defended the United States during World War II.

Some Chinese American veterans attended San Diego State University post discharge. For example, **Jennings Hom**, who was part of the all-Chinese American 555th Air Service Squadron of the 14th Air Force and who had served in India and China during World War II, received his B.A. in Business Administration; his family owned Woo Chee Chong, a Chinese grocery chain. Hom expanded the business by opening stores in Chula Vista, Kearny Mesa, and Oceanside. (The stores were sold in 1995.)


APIDA Center Highlights: News to Know!



Celebrate International Education Week (IEW) with us! Dr. Tom K. Wong is an associate professor and founding director of the <u>U.S. Immigration</u> <u>Policy Center (USIPC)</u> at UCSD. He served as an advisor to the <u>White</u> <u>House Initiative on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders</u>

(WHIAAPI) and was appointed to serve on the <u>California 2020 Census</u> <u>Complete Count Committee (CCC)</u>. He is also Co-Director of the Human Rights and Migration program and won the ACLU Presidential Prize for his work in advancing immigrant rights and justice. His research has been used by policymakers both in the U.S. and in Mexico and in several federal lawsuits to defend DACA, end family separation, and prohibit indefinite child detention. His work has been covered by major media outlets across the country in hundreds of articles.

Celebrate International Education Week (IEW) with us! Originally from Việt Nam, Dr. Yến Lê Espiritu is a Distinguished Professor of Ethnic Studies at UCSD. She has served as Department Chair, President of the Association of Asian American Studies, and Vice President of the Pacific Sociological Association. She also has extensive experience working with refugee and immigrant communities in San Diego. An award-winning author and a recipient of multiple grants, she has published extensively on Asian American communities, critical immigration and refugee studies, and U.S. colonialism and wars in Asia. A founding member of the <u>Critical Refugee Studies</u> <u>Collective</u> (CRSC), Espiritu is the co-author of <u>Departures: An Introduction to</u> <u>Critical Refugee Studies</u> (UC Press, 2022).
