Happy Black History Month!

February is Black History Month, a time to celebrate and acknowledge Black contributions and achievements. Carter G. Woodson (1875-1950) was a historian and scholar who is known as the "father of black history." He said, "If a race has no history, if it has no worthwhile tradition, it becomes a negligible factor in the thought of the world, and it stands in danger of being exterminated."

Learning about our histories and our cultural heritages is extremely important to the APIDA Center. APIDA history is tied to Black history in so many ways; an early example of APIDA-Black solidarity is when Frederick Douglass (1818-1895), an abolitionist, used his large platform to support the migration of Chinese immigrants who had faced many exclusion laws in early U.S. history.

APIDA Center learns about gentrification in Black and APIDA neighborhoods!

In 1903, the Bing Tong Kong building was constructed in what is today known as the Gaslamp Quarter in downtown San Diego. It became a site of significance for the APIDA community since it served as both a business site and residence for Japanese and Chinese merchants from the early 1900s-1940s. Today, the Horton Grand Hotel is in its place.

On the corner of Second Avenue and Market Street, there is a commemorative plaque stating, "Former Site, Douglas Hotel, 1924." This hotel was a landmark for the Black community and was considered the "Harlem of the West" as it was a vibrant art and music scene - the Creole Palace nightclub was attached to the building. The Douglas Hotel was famous for housing celebrities like Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, and Billie Holiday. It accommodated Black visitors during segregation and lodged a large African American population. It was destroyed in 1985 for mixed-use residential and commercial development.

Black residents and Asian immigrants were both pushed out as a result of the urban reconstruction of San Diego which took place in the 1950s-1970s. These projects sponsored by the federal government led to the development of residential areas, modern housing structures, and interstate highway systems. However, this urban development came at a cost as it displaced Black, Latinx, and APIDA working class communities. By 1967, 400,000 families, who were considered low-income and minorities, were displaced.

In 1986, San Diego created a list of 369 "historic landmarks." Racial bias was evident as only two Mexican American, one Filipino American, and eight Chinese American structures were named historic landmarks. Black historic sites did not make the list.


APIDA and Black communities fought back. In the 1990s, a historic Chinese mission building, former church, and school was targeted. The San Diego Chinese Historical Society was formed and advocated for the preservation of this multi-purpose building. The building was saved and relocated to J Street and Third Avenue. Similarly, Black organizing formed the Gaslamp Black Historical Society. They pushed for the preservation of the Clermont/Coast Hotel which became the first designated African American site in 2001.

APIDA Center celebrates dumplings!


