APIDA Center learns about Mexipino communities in San Diego!

Mexican and Filipino (or Mexipino) communities in San Diego developed close ties due to a history of Spanish colonization and similarities in culture. As communities of color, they also faced similar discriminatory experiences. Systemic division of White and non-White residents intensified in the 1930s-1960s. This produced multiracial ethnic enclaves of working-class immigrants in San Diego. One of the most distinct multiracial communities were Filipino and Mexican neighborhoods, churches, and social gathering spaces established in Barrio Logan, National City, and Downtown San Diego.

Historically, San Diego's racial discrimination in the housing sector was backed by the federal government. In 1938, the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) stated that in order to maintain neighborhood stability, properties should be "occupied by the same social and racial classes." Immigrant groups were forced to settle in industrialized areas where housing was older and health hazards were more prevalent. Logan Heights, known today as Barrio Logan, was one of the neighborhoods that housed a high concentration of Black, Filipino, Latinx, and Chamorro residents. In 1965, the Fair Employment Practices Commissions deemed San Diego as, "one of the most segregated areas in the country" which was tied to employment discrimination.

Before 1910, Mexican and Filipino residents established communities in National City, Chula Vista, Imperial Beach, and San Ysidro. Up to the 1960s, National City and Barrio Logan became the primary areas of settlement for Mexicans and Filipinos. These immigrant communities preferred to stay within racialized spaces that supported their cultures, languages, and traditions. This led to the development of Mexican and Filipino catholic churches. Popular places of worship that welcomed both Mexicans and Filipinos were Saint Anthony of Padua and Saint Mary in National City. In Barrio Logan, Our Lady of Guadalupe was frequented by both groups.

In National City, Toledo's Produce on Palm Avenue, was owned by a Filipino-Mexican couple, James Toledo and his wife. The Toledos sold produce from their farm as well as Filipino and Mexican food.

From 1920-1965, Mexicans and Filipinos gathered at restaurants, barbershops, gambling dens and pool halls in the Filipino District of downtown San Diego. During the rise of the taxi dance halls in the 1920-1930s, Filipino and Mexican bachelors found community at the Rizal Dance Hall on Market Street. Oral histories suggests that Filipino and Mexican families contributed money and food to feed Filipino and Mexican agricultural workers during the Great Depression (1929-1941).
