APIDA Center celebrates AANAPISI Week!

AANAPISI stands for "Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institutions." With 14% of our students identifying as APIDA, SDSU meets the criteria to be a <u>federally-designated AANAPISI-eligible institution</u>. This year, AANAPISI Week is September 25-October 1. This is a time to celebrate federal support of higher education efforts to support APIDA student populations.

This week was chosen as AANAPISI Week because the AANAPISI program was first established by Congress on September 27, 2007. Its purpose was to improve the availability and quality of postsecondary education programs to support APIDA students. Since then, AANAPISIs have made a difference in the lives of many APIDA students across the United States and the Pacific. That stated, we need to continue to urge Congress to increase AANAPISI funding.

On September 22, 2023, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr, issued the first-ever Proclamation on AANAPISI Week. He said, "AANAPISIs enroll nearly half of all AA and NHPI undergraduates, and they confer almost 50 percent of associate degrees and nearly 30 percent of baccalaureate degrees of all AA and NHPI students. These vital institutions empower students to earn degrees and reach their full potential while providing culturally responsive services and culturally sustaining programs that include tutoring, advising, career development and counseling, and more. With the Supreme Court's recent decision to effectively end affirmative action in college admissions, the work to make higher education accessible to all is as essential as ever. We need to keep open the doors of opportunities and ensure that the promise of America is big enough for everyone to succeed."
