
A Ruby Night!

APIDA Center watches "Out of the Boondocks"!

The APIDA Center has held screenings for "Out of the Boondocks" on Wednesday nights all throughout October. "Out of the Boondocks" is a docuseries based in San Diego that showcases Filipinx American creatives. Filmed in key Fil-Am neighborhoods across San Diego, it features various Fil-Am artists, educators, and leaders.

The word "boondock" derives from the Tagalog word "bundók," which translates to "mountain." During the Philippine-American War (1899-1902), the United States fought against Filipino revolutionaries in a guerilla war intended to subjugate the Philippines as a colony. U.S. military personnel had to navigate the mountain range of the Cordillera Central, located in Luzon. Soldiers adopted the phrase "boondock" to refer to distant, inland areas. It became common U.S. military slang for the countryside or jungle. During the Vietnam War (1955-1975), U.S. military officials referred to rural areas as the "boonies." Because of the duality of the word "boondock" it is interpreted to represent "hidden strength in the Filipino-American experience" as stated by the docuseries producers and co-hosts: Jay Jay Maniquis and Rio Villa.

Maniquis is a SDSU alumnus (Class of 2007) and a San Diego native. As a video creator, he is famous for his YouTube series, "Jaycation." Maniquis partnered with Villa to co-create "Out of the Boondocks." Villa and Maniquis are committed to representation, storytelling, and cultural awareness through television. (Fun Fact: The APIDA Center hosted both Maniquis and Villa during our FAHM celebrations in 2022.)

This ground-breaking series is historical in that it is putting Fil-Am creativity in San Diego on the map. It is documenting Fil-Am culture today. The APIDA Center recommends watching "Out of the Boondocks" on KPBS - Season 2 was just released a couple of weeks ago! Watch history in the making!








APIDA Center eats at The Garden!

On Tuesday, October 24, we hosted a workshop about Malunggay, a superfood that is used in many Filipino medicinal practices and cuisine. On Wednesday, October 25, we hosted a workshop about the significance of 1898, which marks the signing of the Treaty of Paris which led to U.S. colonization of the Philippines.





APIDA Center hosts Student-Led workshops!

On Thursday, October 26, several of our A-LIST (APIDA Leadership, Identity, Scholarship, and Togetherness) presented Student-Led Workshops as part of their final projects for their university seminar.

Alyssa Gross, Patricia Alfonso, and Luke Sibayan presented about the impact of Carlos Bulosan's writings. They shared information about Bulosan's life and legacy, read some of his most powerful poems, and then had participants write their own Bulosan-inspired poems. Jalen Rodriguez, Kelly Fortunato, and Reanne Manuyag presented about the evolution of Taglish (code-switching between Tagalog and English). They shared the impacts of colonization of the learning of English and then hosted activities where participants practiced saying Taglish words and phrases.
