APIDA Center learns about San Diego's Miss Vietnam!

In Vietnam, Lunar New Year is known as Tết nguyên đán. This celebration is held over the course of 3-7 days. During this time, it is common to celebrate by creating ancestral altars, eating traditional food, and decorating Tết trees to welcome prosperity. Symbolic carvings on watermelons, festive lanterns, and flowers are abundant at Tết celebrations. The San Diego Tết Festival is the second largest Vietnamese New Year celebration in Southern California. This year the festival will be held in Mira Mesa from February 16-18, 2024. This festival is a significant gathering space for 35,000+ Vietnamese-identifying residents across San Diego. Some features of this festival include lion dances, a Golden Voice singing competition, and the Miss Vietnam San Diego Pageant.

In Southern Vietnam, a local Miss Vietnam beauty contest was held in Saigon. It later became a nation-wide event. In 1955, Công Thị Nghĩa was the first Miss Vietnam. This tradition has traveled to the United States through the Vietnamese diaspora and serves as an act of cultural preservation. Vietnamese American participants enter the beauty contest with the intention to learn about and represent their Vietnamese heritage. Contestants are evaluated based on their poise, grace, intellectuality, and individuality. Some competitions of Miss Vietnam in the United States enforce more restrictions related to morality and the public display of the female body. During the competition, women wear the traditional Áo Dài. This garment with 300 years of history has become a symbol of Vietnamese femininity. Pageant participants are also expected to embody teamwork through a group cultural dance. They also respond to questions about the Vietnamese culture.

Several SDSU students and alumni have participated in the <u>local pageant</u> and have even claimed the crown. Some SDSU contestants include **Jenny Hoang Lai, Tam-Nhu Lam, Tran Tran, Kathy Vu, Linh Tran**, and more!






APIDA Center hosts various events!


APIDA Center learns about Hmong history!
