

#### **APIDA Center applauds the Dong Family!**

The APIDA Center celebrates the \$5 million gift from Ron Dong and Lloyd Dong Jr. to the Black Resource Center (BRC) in support of Black student academic achievement, leadership, and service opportunities. In February 2024, SDSU President Adela de la Torre announced that the BRC will be renamed to honor the legacy of Gus and Emma Thompson, two Black residents of San Diego who extended their generosity to APIDA immigrants, specifically the Dong family.

During the 1840s, China faced difficult economic conditions including floods and famines. From 1850-1870, Chinese immigrants ventured to California for the Gold Rush. Many settled in Northern California, then dispersed to seek employment in railroad construction, farming, restaurants, laundries, etc. By the 1870s, an economic depression used Chinese American laborers as a scapegoat for a decline in employment opportunities. Resentments and xenophobia intensified. The 1882 Chinese Exclusion Act was the epitome of anti-Chinese legislation. This law made housing, employment, and social mobility difficult and/or non-existent for Chinese immigrants.

Many Chinese American immigrants suffered from socio-economic exclusion. Some Chinese Americans succeeded by developing their own ethnic enclaves, such as the APIDA immigrant population in historic Gaslamp Quarter, San Diego. There, early Chinese immigrants began to form businesses and culturally-centered community spaces. However, these structures did not develop until the 1900s-1940s.

The Dong family arrived in San Diego during the 1930s. Like other Chinese at the time, they experienced discrimination. They had befriended Gus and Emma Thompson. The Thompsons rented their home in Coronado to the Dongs; this was done in the face of national anti-Asian housing discrimination. The Thompsons understood the significance of racial minorities supporting one another in the face of White supremacy and xenophobia in the United States. They offered the Dong family the option to rent-to-own the property; they did this at a time when such offers were not made to Chinese immigrants. APIDA people faced barriers to land ownership during the 1900s especially with California's enactment of the Alien Land Laws in 1913 which forbade immigrants with Asian descent to purchase land and assume ownership. These laws further intensified in 1923 and were not eradicated until 1956.

After Gus Thompson's death, Emma sold the Coronado property to the Dong family. The Dong family remained at this residence for multiple generations. The last inheritors were Ron Dong and Lloyd Dong Jr. who decided to sell the property and donate the profit to support the Black community at SDSU. Gus had not only provided housing to the Dong family but supported their economic success by supporting their business ventures. He was an active advocate for the communities of color in Coronado and greater San Diego. His act of cross-cultural solidarity lives on in the Dongs' generous donation to SDSU.




#### **APIDA Center hosts Holi Festival events!**

#### **APIDA Center hosts Dr. Alfred P. Flores!**

On March 27, Dr. Alfred P. Flores, one of the few CHamoru scholars in academia, gave a webinar about his newest book, *Tip of the Spear: Land, Labor, and US Settler Militarism in Guahan, 1944-1962*. We had an online audience and a watch party at the Center. Flores talked about what it means to be possessed by another country and the differences between U.S. and Pacific Islander ideologies regarding land (i.e., ownership versus stewardship). He acknowledged the importance of showing up to events like these and learning about our histories. Advocacy starts with knowledge. Much appreciation to <u>PISA</u> for rolling out to this event.

This \$500K grant from the U.S. Department of Justice Office on Violence Against Women will bolster a gender-based violence project for SDSU's cultural resource centers.
